This summer, **Krystal Collins/new growth collective** will present a site-specific, movement-based performance commission and presentation at the **Hillwood Estate**, **Museum & Gardens** from **Wednesday**, **July 21 to Sunday**, **July 25**. In partnership with Hillwood, the performance work will be presented in tandem with California-based sculpture artist Kristine Mays' incoming sculpture installation, *Rich Soil*. The exhibition features 29 life-sized sculptures capturing bodies in motion; Mays says that her sculptures were inspired by Alvin Ailey's acclaimed work, *Revelations*. Each of the installations are accompanied by narratives written by Mays which are inspired by African-American sayings, culture, and folklore.

In dialogue with *Rich Soil,* Krystal Collins/new growth collective's commissioned work aims to **amalgamate** many facets of Blackness, including queerness, girl/womanhood, popular culture, joy, and ancestral and spiritual practices. This inaugural work as Krystal Collins/new growth collective will leverage these themes in order to create a sustainable artistic practice that is community-centered.
